#### **Semester Hours Required**

A minimum of 120 semester hours and 45 upperdivision semester hours (300 and 400 level courses) are required for a bachelor's degree.

## **First Year Composition Requirement**

Students must demonstrate reasonable proficiency in written English by achieving a grade of "C" or better in both ENG 101 and 102 or in ENG 105 or their equivalents. Should a student receive a grade lower than "C" in any of the courses, it must be repeated until the specified proficiency is demonstrated.

# **General Studies Requirements**

All undergraduate students in the College of Public Programs are required to complete the university General Studies requirements in order to be eligible for graduation in any of the undergraduate curricula offered by the college. Many general studies requirements may simultaneously fulfill college and major requirements (see shaded regions).

#### **College Requirements**

In addition to the university General Studies requirement, the College of Public Programs requires the following:

### **Communication Requirement**

All undergraduate majors are required to take one of the following courses:

These courses present an overview of human communication and help the student to develop oral presentation skills and competence. The course may be included within the university General Studies requirements and major requirements where appropriate.

## **Computer Science Requirement**

A computer science course is required for all undergraduate majors in the College of Public Programs. Any CS course from the university General Studies list that involves the use of computer application skills is acceptable. It may be included within the Mathematical Studies requirement where appropriate. Please see your academic advisor for a complete list of acceptable courses. # **Limitation on Physical Education Activity Hours**

No more than eight hours of physical education activity courses may be counted within the minimum 120 hours required for graduation.

## Pass/Fail Option

The College of Public Programs does not offer any courses for pass/fail credit. Courses completed for pass/fail credit outside the College of Public Programs may count only as elective credit in meeting degree requirements.

# **Bachelor of Science in Recreation Management and Tourism**

The Bachelor of Science degree program in the Department of Recreation Management and Tourism centers around the systematic study of leisure-related phenomena, including human behavior and development, resource use, environmental and social issues, and public policy. It is a professional program that features full exposure of students to a multifaceted concept of leisure and the quality preparation of these students for professional-level entry into leisure service occupations. By graduation, the recreation management and tourism student will be equipped with vital academic and professional tools: a complete understanding of the leisure profession through both theoretical and applied perspectives, a specialization or area of concentration within the field, and the practical and academic experience to excel in both professional arenas and academia.

## **Admission to Professional Status**

Upon admission to the university, recreation students are classified as preprofessional status. The Recreation Management and Tourism Department requires a minimum of 56 semester hours with a minimum of 2.50 cumulative GPA before being officially admitted with professional status. Upper division core courses within the Recreation Management and Tourism programs cannot be taken until professional status is attained. Transfer students who have completed 56 semester hours or more at another institution must remove any scholastic deficiencies before being admitted with professional status.

Students may achieve professional status by completing a minimum of 56 semester hours including the following:

- ENG 101 and 102 or equivalent (grade of "C" or better)
- College of Public Programs writing competence requirement
- University math requirement: MAT 114, 117, or higher.
- College of Public Programs computer requirement
- College of Public Programs communication requirement
- REC 120 Leisure and the Quality of Life ("C" or better)
- REC 210 Leisure Delivery Systems ("C" or better)

Those with a concentration in Tourism or Therapeutic Recreation will need another course in addition to the above:

Tourism – ECN 112 Microeconomics Principles Therapeutic Rec. – BIO 201 Anatomy & Physiology

#### **Additional Department Requirements**

Students are not permitted to take additional course work during their senior internship placement. Approval of internships must be requested from the Department of Recreation Management and Tourism.

A student must attain a grade of "C" or higher in all courses within the major, including the related area.
