COLLEGE GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

You CANNOT cross-list (double count) courses from the College Graduation requirements with the University General Studies HU, SB, SG or SQ areas.

The Bridge course requirement cannot be double counted to fill any other requirements for the university or college.

Pass/Fail courses may NOT be used to satisfy any of these requirements.
