The emphasis of this folder is on the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences requirements. Although space is provided for your major, you must consult your major department (which, in most cases, has its own curriculum check sheet) for specific information concerning your field of specialization.

ADVISEMENT:

- It is the student's responsibility to meet the requirements of the major, college and university in order to graduate.
- Students normally receive advisement in their major departments.
- Students on probation or disqualified, students desiring to transfer into CLAS from other colleges within the University, and students needing evaluation of out-of-state transfer credits should contact the Office for Academic Programs, SS 111, (480) 965-6506.

REMINDER: Declarations of Graduation are due in SS 111 immediately after students enroll in their 87th hour. Deadlines: Fall semester, October 1. Spring semester, March 1.

NOTE: These College requirements are separate from the University General Studies requirements. Only courses whose **prefixes** are specified in the following lists qualify as College Graduation courses.

In most major fields, students will be considered to have fulfilled the College Graduation requirement in the division of their major (Humanities, Social and Behavioral Sciences, or Natural Sciences and Mathematics). Students majoring in Kinesiology, Family and Human Development, and Speech and Hearing Science must satisfy College Graduation requirements in all three divisions. Students majoring in Chicana/o Studies and African American Studies fulfill the requirements of the division of their major concentration only. Students majoring in Women's Studies may only fill the CLAS Social and Behavioral Sciences distribution area with courses in their major.
