Nine hours of upper division coursework from the approved list and twelve hours of residence credit at ASU. Eligibility to pursue the minor requires a major or pre-major other than Urban and Metropolitan Studies. Students pursuing the Urban and Metropolitan Studies Minor must see an advisor in their major in order to add the minor to their degree audit (DARS). If a Program of Study has been completed instead of DARS (athletes and those following older catalogs), then complete a minor verification form available in the College of Public Programs.
