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# Tuition and fees

The following tuition and fee policy experienced a change for the 2024-2025 academic year. These changes occurred after the publication of the 2024-2025 academic catalog archive.

## ASU tuition and fee descriptions

### Surcharge fee

On Sept. 16, 2024, Arizona State University announced [1] that a tuition surcharge will be implemented in the spring 2025 semester. The surcharge, as well as other related actions taken by ASU, protects the university's ongoing financial health following the \$24 million cut to ASU's budget enacted by the state legislature and governor of Arizona. This surcharge for the 2024–2025 academic year will be based on spring 2025 enrollment and added to the spring 2025 semester bills of undergraduate and graduate campus immersion students. It will be posted to My ASU beginning in late November.

- If you are taking fewer than seven credit hours in spring 2025, you will see a charge of \$50 per credit hour.
- If you enroll in seven or more credit hours in spring 2025, you will see the maximum charge of \$350 per semester.

There will be no surcharge added to summer sessions. ASU will continue to pursue restoration of state funding that would allow for the elimination of this tuition surcharge. Until state leaders act to restore funding, students should plan for assessment of the tuition surcharge, including in the 2025–2026 academic year.

#### Please note:

- Students in the Obama Scholars, Arizona Promise and College Attainment Grant programs will see the tuition surcharge on their bill, but will receive additional funds to cover the surcharge.
- Students QTR waivers and RA/TAs will see the tuition surcharge, but will receive additional funds to cover or reduce the surcharge amount.

**Program Description:**

The MS program in cytology is for students seeking to advance their current careers in the clinical laboratory, becoming specialists in minimally invasive diagnostic methods. This program's focus on early disease detection and diagnosis is based on the visual analysis of microscopic cellular findings and connecting those findings with the patient's clinical history.

Through virtual labs and didactic coursework, students build their knowledge in anatomy, pathophysiology, histology and cytopathology across every organ system. Students integrate this knowledge with microscopic screening and diagnostic skills to identify cancers, infectious diseases and other clinically significant microscopic changes. The curriculum incorporates current advanced diagnostic technologies, including molecular diagnostics, immunohistochemical biomarkers and digital pathology. Students are prepared for day-to-day quality assurance activities as well as principles of laboratory operations and management.

A required in-person clinical practicum experience allows students to refine their skills in a cytology clinical laboratory setting under the supervision of practicing cytologists and pathologists.

Emphasizing technical expertise, critical thinking and ethical standards essential for health professional practice, graduates are prepared to excel in a broad range of clinical environments, addressing critical health care needs with precision and innovation.

Pending program accreditation, completion of this program qualifies students to take the American Society of Clinical Pathology Board of Certification examination in cytology. Certification is required for full clinical practice as a cytologist.

#### Additional Curriculum Information

The MDL 580 Practicum is a required, in-person, hands-on experience to be conducted at a clinical laboratory under the

guidance of an approved supervisor. Students are responsible for finding their practicum site (likely their place of employment) and are encouraged to connect with the unit early to discuss the process for securing a practicum site, if needed.

The program culminates in a noncredit-bearing portfolio where students synthesize their cytology theory and clinical experience. This reflective and integrative portfolio showcases student proficiency and serves as a valuable tool for future career advancement and professional development.

Technical Standards: Color blindness makes it challenging for some individuals to differentiate between some colors, shades of colors or see color brightness, and it may diminish observational skills required for laboratory testing. Individuals with color blindness can be trained to differentiate and characterize the colors of stains, reagents, microscopic cells, labels, biologic devices or any device or printout used in diagnostic laboratory procedures. The statement of purpose should describe the educational background, scholarly interests and academic and professional goals of the applicant.

It is preferred that the letters of recommendation are from faculty members who know the applicant's work well; if this is not possible, then recommendations should come from individuals in supervisory or professional roles.

## **Psychology (Sport Psychology), MS (ASPGSSPMS). Admission requirements change. Fall 2024.**

### **Current Admission Requirements:**

Applicants are eligible to apply to the program if they have earned a bachelor's or master's degree in psychology or a related field from a regionally accredited institution.

Applicants are required to submit:

1. graduate admissions application and application fee
2. official transcripts
3. statement of purpose
4. two letters of recommendation
5. proof of English proficiency

**Additional Admission Information**

It is recommended that applicants have a background in psychology, sociology, communication, kinesiology, nutrition or a closely related field. Required program coursework assumes a basic understanding of social science statistics and research methods. It is strongly recommended that applicants have completed a statistics course or a research methods course.

The statement of purpose should describe the educational background, scholarly interests, and academic and professional goals of the applicant.

It is preferred that the letters of recommendation are from faculty members who know the applicant's work well; if these are not available, then recommendations should be from individuals in supervisory or professional roles.

### **Previous Admission Requirements:**

Applicants are eligible to apply to the program if they have earned a bachelor's or master's degree in psychology, sociology, communication, kinesiology, nutrition or related field from a regionally accredited institution.

Applicants are required to submit:

1. graduate admissions application and application fee
2. official transcripts
3. personal statement
4. two letters of recommendation
5. proof of English proficiency

#### Additional Admission Information

The statement of purpose should describe the educational background, scholarly interests, and academic and professional goals of the applicant.

It is preferred that the letters of recommendation are from faculty members who know the applicant's work well; if faculty members are not available, then the applicant may submit letters of recommendation from individuals in supervisory or professional roles.

Applicants must provide evidence of successful completion of an introductory psychology course, as well as a statistics course and a research methods course. Typically, these prerequisite courses should be in a social science field; however, applicants may apply with courses outside of a social science field.

## Urban and Environmental Planning, MUEP (ARURBMUEP). Admission requirements change. Fall 2024.

### Current Admission Requirements:

#### Additional Application Information

The personal statement should be no longer than 600 words and must address the applicant's:

1. interest in planning
2. academic or professional background and, if appropriate, preparation for the selected area of specialty (This may include written samples or a portfolio, but they are not required.)
3. educational objectives
4. career goals, including how a master's degree in urban and environmental planning from the School of Geographical Sciences and Urban Planning will help them achieve those goals

Letters of recommendation are not required for admission into the MUEP program. However, prospective students are encouraged to submit up to three letters of recommendation to strengthen their application or provide necessary context to the application. Recommenders may include professional supervisors, colleagues or academic supervisors (e.g., former professors and instructors) who can speak to the applicant's academic or professional experiences and qualifications to pursue a graduate degree.

Examples of situations in which applicants may consider submitting recommenders include:

1. returning students (more than five years after completing undergraduate degree)
2. students with a cumulative GPA between 2.50 and 3.00
3. students with a bachelor's degree in an unrelated field
4. students pursuing a career change from an unrelated field
